## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

These are indeed dynamic and challenging times for our Chapter. Environmental pressures resulting from the demand for services from California's 30 million souls is exacting a terrible toll on the aquatic resources of the State. Everyday in California, over 600 housing units are completed with concomitant demands for energy, transportation, water, and raw materials. Never before have fishery resources been so severely threatened nor has the potential existed to reclaim or restore them.


The State of California and the Federal Water Project developers have a long way to go to create an equitable system of water storage, delivery, and allocation that is responsive to the needs of a healthy aquatic environment. As the decades-long struggle languishes, punctuated by an all-time high

water demand and a prolonged drought, the fishery continue their broad decline. Only a favorable successful passage of the Miller-Bradley Bill, currently making its way through Congress, hold promise for the restoration of these fisheries.

The recently convened "Sierra Summit" brought together various competing interests who, for the first time, sat down together to discuss the continuing demise of the fragile ecosystems of the Sierra Nevadas. It is the birthplace of streams for two states, and it has suffered under the banner of "Multiple Use"; a concept that allows grazing, timber, mining, water and energy development in areas better managed for recreational values and environmental integrity. More meetings are planned, and the time for activism is now.

Many of the varied and complex aquatic ecosystems of California and Nevada are steadily declining towards the same end point that the Upper Sacramento River reached in one horrible night. Headlines screamed of the catastrophic and instantaneous loss of this northern Californian treasure. The public was righteously outraged by and media coverage reached event. international proportions. Even now, there are fervent calls to restore the river and impose tougher regulations to prevent future such episodes. But there are no headlines decrying the slow decline of countless streams, rivers, and estuaries which are silently, inexorably losing their capacity to sustain a once-rich diversity of life. A largely complacent, uninformed society fails to understand the environmental price for that new car, green lawn, glass of wine, or fast-food hamburger.

I challenge each of you in your professional and personal life to provide the best scientific information available to the decision makers and to make a vigorous effort to objectively inform the public of the consequences of those decisions. Seize the moment.



## PROCEEDINGS AVAILABLE





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
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
